## *District Staff Attends ARCSA Accreditation Workshop*

The Edgewood Soil & Water Conservation District staff attended a 200 Level ARCSA Rainwater Harvesting Accreditation Course in Albuquerque on February 15<sup>th</sup> & 16<sup>th</sup>. This "Accredited Professional" Workshop was open to the public and any industry professional interested in pursuing greater understanding of rainwater harvesting. The workshop is required for those seeking ARCSA Accredited Professional (AP) designation. This two-day course provides an in-depth review of rainwater harvesting design and installation; outdoor and in-home rainwater use; sanitation for potable uses; rules, regulations, guidelines and restrictions; business management; project planning; site and installation safety; and system construction and maintenance.

By attending this training, the Edgewood SWCD staff maintains their ARCSA Accredited Professional designation.

The American Rainwater Catchment Systems Association is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that was founded in 1994 by Dr. Hari J. Krishna in Austin, Texas, to promote rainwater catchment systems in the United States. Our memberships consists of professionals working in city, state, and federal government, academia, manufacturers and suppliers of rainwater harvesting equipment, consultants, and other interested individuals. Membership is not limited to the United States, and we encourage all rainwater harvesting enthusiasts to join our organization. 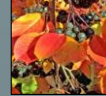

Black Chokeberry



To 6' - Massive display of white flowers, black berries, red autumn color. Berries are high in vitamin C and antioxidants, used in juice and juice blends. Grows well in almost any soil and moisture conditions.

Champlain Rose



To 3' - Rounded, upright form. Outstanding recurrent flowering habit. Deep red, lightly fragrant 3" blooms with 30 petals. Resistant to both mildew and Black Spot.

Coral Berry



To 5' - Purplish red coral-like berries are conspicuous far into winter. Yellowish white flowers with rose blush in June and July. Excellent for bank stabilization.

Green Ash



To 60' - Vigorous, pyramidal to rounded shape, excellent for dense shade. Very hardy. One of the most adaptable trees in urban or suburban sites along roads and streets or in the landscape.

Imperial Poplar



To 120' - Narrow pyramidal habit. Recommended by USDA for disease resistance and very vigorous growth, up to 5-8' per year in prime conditions.

Lilac



To 20' - Shrub. Fragrant lilac colored blossoms in May. Attractive green foliage. Good for windbreak or privacy screen.

Native Plum



To 50' - Shrub or small tree. Profuse white flowers. Very hardy. Excellent for wildlife food and habitat

COST-SHARE PROGRAM APPLICATION  
DEADLINE:  
4/30/12**

**Eligible Applicants** for our program is any person addressing a natural resource problem who owns land within the Edgewood Soil & Water Conservation District boundaries.

*Projects within city limits are not eligible.*

**Categories for applications include:** **Urban:** 1 lot – 639 acres - **Farm / Ranch:** Determined by the Farm Service Agency specifications (Schedule F) and **Community:** Senior Citizen Centers, Parks, Schools, Churches etc.

**Payments** will be made on 50% of the actual cost of the project, or maximum of \$3500, whichever is less. Original receipts must be submitted for reimbursement.

*Maximum cost-share amount is \$3,500 per year.*

**Eligible Practices Include, but not limited to:** Brush Management, Critical Area Planting, Cross Fencing, Diversion, Forest Stand Improvement, Irrigation Pipeline, Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) Conversion, Livestock Pipeline, Water Harvesting and Windbreak Plantings with Drip Irrigation Systems.
